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## **SBA’s Deadline for Physical Damage Loans For Private Non-Profit Organizations Is July 13**

**ATLANTA** – The U.S. Small Business Administration reminds eligible Private Non-Profit Organizations (PNPs) that do not provide critical services of a governmental nature of the **July 13, 2009**, deadline to submit disaster loan applications for physical damages caused by severe storms, flooding and tornadoes that occurred from March 25 - 28, 2009.

Private Non-Profit Organizations (PNPs) located in the counties of Amite, Greene, Jackson, Jefferson, Lawrence, Lincoln, Simpson, Stone, Walthall, Wayne and Wilkinson counties in the State of Mississippi are eligible to apply to SBA. Eligible PNPs are those that provide non critical services such as: food kitchens, homeless shelters, museums, libraries, community centers, schools and colleges.

These organizations may borrow up to \$2 million to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate, machinery and equipment, inventory and other business assets. The SBA also offers mitigation funds to disaster victims based on 20 percent of the verified physical damage. These funds are designed to help borrowers pay for protective measures to minimize damages of the same kind in the future.

The SBA offers Economic Injury Disaster Loans to help PNPs of all sizes meet working capital needs, such as ongoing operating expenses. Economic Injury Disaster Loan assistance is available regardless of whether the PNP suffered any physical property damage.

Interest rate on these is 4 percent with terms up to 30 years. Loan amounts and terms are set by the SBA and are based on each applicant’s financial condition.

“PNP organizations are urged to contact their County Emergency Managers to obtain information about local briefings. At the meeting, PNP representatives will need to provide information about their organization,” said Frank Skaggs, Director of SBA Field Operations Center East.

This information will be used to submit a “Request for Public Assistance” which FEMA uses to determine if the PNP provides an essential governmental service and meets the definition of a “critical facility.” Based on that conclusion, FEMA will either refer the PNP to SBA for disaster loan assistance or possibly provide a “Public Assistance” reimbursement grant for eligible costs.

The deadline to return physical damage applications is **July 13, 2009**. The deadline to return economic injury applications is **February 12, 2010**.
