SBA DISASTER LOAN DEADLINE IS AUGUST 19 ***SMALL BUSINESS OWNERS STILL HAVE TIME TO APPLY***

Atlanta - The U.S. Small Business Administration is reminding disaster victims that **August 19** is the filing deadline for federal economic injury disaster loans that are available to small businesses located in the counties of Elkhart, LaGrange, St. Joseph and Steuben in the State of Indiana as a result of damages and losses to crops caused by drought conditions that occurred from May 1 through September 17, 2008.

“These counties are eligible because they are contiguous to one or more primary counties in the State of Michigan. SBA recognizes that disasters do not usually stop at the county or state lines. For that reason, counties adjacent to primary counties named in the declaration are included,” said Frank Skaggs, Director of SBA’s Field Operations Center East.

“When the Secretary of Agriculture issues a disaster declaration to help farmers recover from damages and losses to crops, the Small Business Administration issues a declaration to assist small businesses and most private, non-profit organizations affected by the same disaster,” Skaggs added.

Under this declaration, SBA’s Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) program is available to farm-related and nonfarm-related small business concerns and small agricultural cooperatives that suffered financial losses as a direct result of this disaster. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible to apply to SBA. Nurseries are eligible to apply for economic injury disaster loans for losses caused by drought conditions.

Eligible small businesses may qualify for loans up to \$2 million. These loans are available at a 4 percent interest rate with loan terms up to 30 years. SBA determines eligibility for the program based on the size and type of business and its financial resources. Loan amounts and terms are set by SBA and are based on each applicant’s financial condition. Under this disaster declaration, SBA cannot provide loans to agricultural producers.

Completed loan applications must be returned to SBA no later than August 19, 2009.
