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SBA DISASTER LOAN DEADLINE IS SEPTEMBER 14; NORTH DAKOTA SMALL BUSINESSES MAY STILL APPLY

ATLANTA - The U.S. Small Business Administration is reminding small businesses that **September 14** is the filing deadline for federal economic injury disaster loans that are available to small businesses located in Richland County in the State of North Dakota as a result of excessive rainfall and freezing temperatures that occurred October 6, 2008 through November 11, 2008.

“This county is eligible because it is contiguous to one or more of the declared counties in the State of Minnesota. SBA recognizes that disasters do not usually stop at the county or state lines. For that reason, counties adjacent to primary counties named in the declaration are included,” said Frank Skaggs, Director of SBA’s Field Operations Center East.

“When the Secretary of Agriculture issues a disaster declaration to help farmers recover from damages and losses to crops, the Small Business Administration issues a declaration to assist small businesses, small agricultural cooperatives and most private non-profit organizations of all sizes affected by the same disaster,” Skaggs added.

Under this declaration, SBA’s Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) program is available to farm-related and nonfarm-related small business concerns, small agricultural cooperatives and most private non-profit organizations of all sizes that suffered financial losses as a direct result of this disaster. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible to apply to SBA.

Eligible small businesses and non-profit organizations may qualify for loans up to \$2 million. These loans are available at a 4 percent interest rate with loan terms up to 30 years. SBA determines eligibility for the program based on the size and type of business and its financial resources. Loan amounts and terms are set by SBA and are based on each applicant’s financial condition. Under this disaster declaration, SBA cannot provide loans to agricultural producers.

Completed loan applications must be returned to SBA no later than September 14, 2009.
